
BACKGROUND

Origin: Following the recommendations of the Working Group on the Third Five Year Plan for Small Scale Industries, the Government of India decided to set up an institution. Accordingly, "Central Industrial Extension Training Institute (CIETI)" was created in Delhi in October 1960 as a Department of Central Government under the Ministry of Commerce and Industry. The main objective was to provide training to the personnel of the Central Small Industries Organisation and of the Departments of Industries of the State Governments.



Pursuant to enactment of MSMED Act, 2006 name was again renamed on 11 April, 2007 as National Institute for Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (ni-msme)

WIDENED THE SCOPE OF ACTIVITIES



The Institute is associated with prestigious world bodies such as UNIDO, UNESCO, ILO, Commonwealth Fund for Technical Cooperation (CFTC), United Nations Children's Education Fund (UNICEF), Afro-Asian Rural Development Organization (AARDO) and ARB Bank (Ghana) and GIZ (Germany). The Institute's collaborative efforts with various international organisations and institutions make its endeavour's more result-oriented.

The Institute's programmes are globally compatible and upgraded according to the expertise accomplishments. Around 300 executives across the world participate and benefiting in take away flairs and potentials every year. **ni-msme** is widely recognised as one of the world's best for its facilities of training, research and extension.



ADMINISTRATION AND MANAGEMENT

The affairs of the Society are managed, administered, directed and controlled through the Governing Council constituted by the Government of India as per Rule 22 (a & b) of Rules and Regulations of the Society. The Society, as provided under Rule 3 of Rules and Regulations, was constituted by the Government of India.

Mr. Kalraj Mishra, Hon'ble Union Cabinet Minister of MSME, GoI is the President of the Society and Chairman of the Governing Council of ni-msme. The Secretary to the Gol, Ministry of MSME is the Vice-President of the Society, Vice-Chairman of the Governing Council and Chairman of the Executive Committee. The Additional Secretary to the GoI & Development Commissioner (MSME) is the Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee. Mr. M. Chandrasekhar Reddy is the Director General of the Institute. The list of Members of the Governing Council and the Executive Committee are provided at **Annexures I and II**, respectively.

The Governing Body acts through the Director General. The Director General is the academic and executive head of **ni-msme**. He functions under the guidance of the Governing Council and the Executive Committee. The academic activity is organised through different academic Schools of Excellence. The Chief Administrative Officer is the head of overall administration and general administrative matters, under the guidance of the Director General.

Grievance Cell

To bring about transparency and to institute an effective Public Grievance Redress and Monitoring System, **ni-msme** has set up a Grievance Cell and Information and Facilitation Counters. The state of public grievances serves as a barometer to gauge the efficiency and effectiveness of the administrative processes and policies of the Institute and the Grievance Cell and the Counters form important components of the machinery set up to facilitate timely redressal of public grievances. Complaints may be lodged at the Grievance Cell and information may be sought from the Facilitation Counters. The addresses are indicated at **Annexure-III**.

INTELLECTUAL GROWTH FACILITIES

Since its inception, **ni-msme** has been rendering services to MSMEs. **ni-msme's** intellectual activities are pursued by its four schools of excellence, through their eleven existing centers, which also include two theme focused cells devoted to specific disciplines.

The schools themselves are inter-disciplinary in nature, focusing on training, research, consultancy, education, extension and IT services in their areas of expertise for the benefit of client organisations, entrepreneurs, association leaders, government officers, bureaucrats, public-private-partnership (PPP) company executives, trainers and others.

INFRASTRUCTURAL FACILITIES

well-laid Infrastructure provides the framework for better and efficient functioning of an organisation. ni-msme's facilities are spread over several hectares of sylvan surroundings and are ranked among the best in the world. Apart from the facilities for teaching and training, the Institute provides an excellent library that offers internet facility with round-the-clock reference-cumreading rooms. Spacious and well-oppointed airconditioned classrooms and conference halls, with state-of-the-art instructional and functional gadgets, computers with specific software for cutting edge IT courses; advanced laptops and other instructional tools make learning at **ni-msme** a pleasant pursuit. The infrastructure at the Institute includes:

Auditorium : 350 persons capacity
 Conference Hall : 125 persons capacity
 18 Lecture Halls : 30-40 persons capacity each

Faculty work-stations with support services

Guest Room Complex: The Institute's clean and comfortable guest rooms, with modern amenities on par with international standards, can accommodate over 280 guests. The hostel complex has clean and hygienic dining facilities, serving appetising cuisines that make the campus a home away from home for the participants. The hospitality wing has the following features:

- Multi-cuisine mess with three dining halls
- Accommodation 140 rooms that can house up to 280 persons
- Guests and participants are accommodated in air-conditioned or non air-conditioned rooms.
- · Suites for VIPs and dignitaries
- All rooms are equipped with TV, wi-fi and intercomfacilities.

Closed circuit cameras: CC cameras with a limited set of monitors are located at strategic points on the **ni-msme** campus for surveillance.

Sports and games: Fitness, enthusiasts among the Participants at the Institute use the jogging track and gym on the campus. The campus also has facilities for playing tennis and football (outdoor games); and for badminton, table tennis, chess and caroms (indoor games).

Medical Care: A visiting physician is available in

the campus during fixed hours and also available 24/7 on call to attend health issues.

Recreational Facilities: The amphitheatre Kalangan provides an ideal venue for staging entertainment concerts and to show-case the creative talents of the participants.

Musings is another outdoor location within the campus, set amidst tall trees beside a pond that is best suited for get-togethers. **Utsav** is a wonderful location for outdoor meetings and social gatherings. The Herbal Vista, which houses medicinal and aromatic plants, is well maintained and visitors can soak in the natural ambience.

Water Treatment (RO) Plant: A water treatment plant was installed on the top floor of the canteen. The Plant is planned to meet the requirement of drinking water in all the buildings located in the campus and supply pure drinking water to the national and international participants and the staff of the Institute.

Parking: Two new facilities have been added to the campus infrastructure by way of a covered walkway connecting the New Training Building and the dining block, and a covered parking space for four wheelers and two wheelers. Coincidentally, the ground at the premises has also been graded and levelled to suit the contour of the land.








ni-msme ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

NEW INITIATIVES

Progress in SFURTI implementation



The review meet of SFURTI clusters was held on 3rd May 2017 at ni-msme campus. Representatives of implementing agencies, technical agencies, SPV and CDEs of Pembarthy Metalware Cluster, Mothukur Ikat Handloom Cluster, Kondapalli Wooden Toys Cluster and Pedana Kalamkari Cluster. K. Surya Prakash Goud, Faculty Member of ni-msme elucidated the observations of the Ministry and action to be taken for timely implementation of the project. The implementing agencies stated their problems in implementing hard interventions. The meeting proposed regular review of the project by the technical agency. Mrs. Sohini Chaparala, TA, IL & FS summed up the progress of Kondapalli Toys Cluster: opening the bank account, registering the SPV and timelines for completing the interventions. Mr. L. Vijay Kumar and G. Raj Kumar of NRCD provided inputs on maintaining files and documents, preparing machinery specifications, and verified the work orders and uploaded data in SFURTI Web Portal. Mr. K. Surya Prakash Goud advised all the clusters to submit the statement of expenditure and take immediate action for uploading cluster data on SFURTI web portal. Construction of CFC and sales outlet were discussed, and assurance was given regarding for speedy implementation of the project. Members were asked to make action plan for implementing soft interventions in consultation with technical agency and further suggested covering all the artisans under the social security schemes (e.g., Pradhan Mantri Jeevan Jyothi and Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bhima Yojana) and create awareness on the schemes among them.

Chittoor Coir Cluster

The Ministry of MSME has approved SFURTI implementation for the Chittoor Coir Cluster. As the Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) had problem in

identifying suitable land for CFC, **ni-msme** approached the District Rural Development Authority (DRDA) to actively participate in implementing the scheme.

Mr. K. Surya Prakash Goud, Faculty Member, ni-msme; and Mr. Y. Chandra Reddy, CDE of the cluster met Mr. Ravi Prakash Reddy, Project Director, DRDA on 1st May 2017, to discuss the status of the project. The discussions focused on allotment of land, SPV contribution, identification of new artisans, changing IA/SPV. Mr. Ravi Prakash Reddy announced that the Government of Andhra Pradesh has allotted land for CFC and is ready to arrange SPV contribution. Later, Mr. Goud presented the profile of APITCO Ltd.

SFURTI progress at kalamkari cluster

Mr. Chandramouli, Hon'ble South Zone member, KVIC visited Srikalahasti kalamkari crafts cluster on 2nd May 2017 to review the progress of SFURTI implementation. Accompanied by Mr. K. Surya Prakash Goud, Faculty Member, **ni-msme** and Mr. G. Sudhakar Reddy, CDE of the cluster, he visited the CFC, under construction at Palamala village. He advised them to prepare progress report on both soft and hard interventions, showing the timelines, and issued suitable instructions to the CDE regarding various works.

Later, Mr. Chandramouli visited the production centre and interacted with the artisans about developing new designs, production, wages and their income.

PSC meeting

The Project Steering Committee (PSC) of the Khadi & Village Industries Commission (KVIC) was held on 11th May 2017 in Mumbai. Mr. Surya Prakash Goud, Faculty Member, **ni-msme** attended on behalf of **ni-msme** and presented the DSR of Jonnada Food Processing Cluster along with Mr. Raja Babu, President, M/s Society for Rural Self-Development and Rehabilitation, the proposed implementing agency, Kadiyam Mandal, Andhra Pradesh.

The committee members enquired about the SPV contribution, land availability, scope for product diversification and marketing strategy. They suggested including different food products to increase the product range so that the artisans will have economic activity throughout the year.

















Bhoomi Puja for Pembarthy CFC



The Ministry of MSME has approved SFURTI implementation for Pembarthy Metalware Cluster, for which **ni-msme** is the nodal agency while IL&FS Clusters Ltd. is the technical agency.

The Bhoomi Pooja for the CFC was performed by Vishwakarma Brass Copper and Silver Ind. Coop. Society Ltd., Pembarthi - the implementing agency, on 28th May 2017.

Dr. B. Narasaiah Goud, Hon'ble Member of Parliament did the Bhoomi Pooia for the sales outlet building in the presence of Mrs. A. Sri Devasena, District Magistrate and Collector, and other dignitaries, also on 28th May 2017. Later, Dr. Goud, addressing the artisans, suggested developing new and innovative designs to sell in the national and international markets, and gave several examples for improving their business. Further he stressed the need for revival and continuation of traditional activity, which plays an important role in the economy and would help arrest migration of rural people, and assured support for marketing of brassware products. He congratulated the nodal agency and technical agency for their sincere efforts towards implementing the project.

The Collector advised the artisans to focus on latest designs, machineries, and methods of marketing their products to promote them in and around the state. Appreciating the skills of Pembarthi artisans, she assured best support from the state government. The President, Chairman and other members of the Society shared their opinions and requested a few provisions for the development of the society in their addresses.

Mrs. Sharmista Mahapatra and Mr. H.K. Chary of IL&FS, and Mr. Surya Prakash Goud, Faculty of **ni-msme** were present on the occasion and extended their support.

Mothkur Ikat Handloom Cluster

Mr K. Surrya Prakash Goud, Faculty of **ni-msme**, visited the Mothkur Ikat Handloom Cluster on 28th May 2017 along with Mrs. Sharmista Mahapatra and Mr. H.K. Chary of IL&FS Clusters Ltd. and visited and interacted with the weavers and other members who are participating in the skill development programme. They interacted with the trainees and Mr. Ch. Parameswar, CDE about the programme inputs, profile of the faculty, etc.

Mrs. Sharmista advised the implementing agency to focus on demand driven product designs and help the artisans to improve their skills in dyeing and weaving to achieve better quality and productivity improvement. They also discussed with SPV members regarding the progress of hard interventions.





The Office of the DC (MSME), in association with ni-msme, had organised a two-day national workshop for the benefit of the Cluster Development Officers (CDOs) under the Micro and Small Enterprises Cluster Development Programme (MSE-CDP), during 2-3 June 2017 at the Institute campus.

















The themes discussed included: role and responsibilities of the CDO, strategies for implementation of cluster development projects, significance of detailed project report, analysis and appraisal of detailed project report, and reporting mechanism. Later, the participating CDOs formed into groups and held group discussions on best practices and challenges, and made some recommendations.

Dr. K.K. Jalan, Secretary (MSME), who graced the concluding session, interacted with the delegates. Appreciating the topics covered and efforts put in by the officers during the workshop, he gave them some advice on better implementation of MSE-CDP. He suggested developing a database of the clusters vetted by the stakeholders across the country so as to bridge the gap between the Ministry and the stakeholders. Further, he asked them to submit at least one CFC proposal from their respective states after field Mr. S.N. Tripathi, IAS, AS & DC (MSME) witnessed all the presentations given by the CDOs and gave invaluable suggestions on various issues. He appreciated the best practices highlighted by the CDOs. The ensuing discussions focused on identifying solutions to various challenges faced by the CDOs. The DC (MSME) stressed on the role and responsibilities of the CDO and urged them to be cluster mentors with pro-active mind-set.

Earlier, Mr. R.K. Rai, Director (CD), Office of the DC (MSME), after introducing the officers, summed up the proceedings and outcome of the workshop. He also made a presentation highlighting the importance of social capital for larger gains to MSMEs, quoting examples of clusters, where mutual cooperation has immensely benefited the units. The CDOs made presentations on best practices and challenges in the implementation of cluster projects.

During the inaugural session on the 2nd June, Mr. M. Chandrasekhar Reddy, Director General, **ni-msme** welcomed the CDOs from all MSME-DIs, and pointed out that the Govt. of India is giving thrust to cluster development to enhance the

competitiveness of the MSME sector. He expressed happiness at the opportunity to organise the workshop and also highlighted the significance of the CDO's role in the success of the programme. Further, he emphasized the importance of 'Owning a Cluster' and urged the CDOs to nurture the cluster as their own child. Earlier, Mr. C.S.S. Rao, Dy. Director, Office of the DC (MSME) outlined the objectives of the workshop and observed that the workshop helps the officers to discuss various issues involved in the implementation of cluster development projects and share their experiences. He called on all the CDOs to participate actively in all the sessions. The participating CDOs expressed satisfaction with the workshop design and content, and thanked the AS & DC (MSME) for his support and guidance on successful implementation of the projects.

Cluster Initiatives in Jharkhand

The Govt. of Jharkhand has engaged ni-msme services for implementing cluster development programme. ni-msme will support cluster stakeholders in capacity building and facilitate the establishment of common facility centres. In this regard, Mr. K. Surya Prakash Goud of ni-msme visited Ranchi to meet Mr. K. Ravi Kumar, IAS, Director of Industries, Govt. of Jharkhand and the officials of Jharkhand Infrastructure Development Corporation (JIDCO) during 3-4 July 2017, along with Mr. B.L.N. Das, General Manager (Clusters), and Mr. D.P. Vidhyarthi, General Manager (Infrastructure), JIDCO to discuss arranging exposure visits for SPV members, conducting training in management of CFCs, and providing mentoring services during the implementation of various interventions. JIDCO had organised a workshop on 4th July inviting the officials from select DICs, and SPVs of proposed clusters. Mr. Goud interacted with cluster stakeholders regarding their infrastructural requirements in CFCs, mobilisation of funds, specifications of machinery, business operations, etc.

















Cluster Initiatives in Jharkhand



Mr. L. Vijay Kumar visited the NBCFDC office at Bengaluru on the 11th July and discussed with Mr. Ekanatappa, Managing Director regarding transportation of raw material, marketing skills, lack of information on latest machinery and markets, and need for conducting skill development programmes. Mr. Ekanatappa highlighted their schemes for women artisans and children, and SHGs. Further he stated that they provide term loans, service and other loans at less than 2% annual interest which is transferred directly to their account through DBT facility.

Palakkad Pottery & Papiere Mache Products Cluster



Mr. G. Raj Kumar visited Palakkad and Trissur for interaction with the officials of Kerala State Backward Classes Development Corporation, Development Commissioner for Handicrafts, IRTC, KVIB and industries department during 11-17 July 2017. He also visited artisan villages to collect the cluster information. Some of the important officials met included Mrs. Latha, Manager, KSBCDC, Palakkad; Mr. Jacob D'Souza, Assistant Director, HM & SE Centre, Thrissur; Mr. Balakrishna, IEO, Chittoor; Mr. Shiva Das, Officer, Khadi & V.I. Board, Palakkad; and Dr. N.K. Shasidaran Pillai, Director, Integrated Rural Technology Centre, Mundur.

Tirur Virgin Coconut Oil cluster

Mr. G. Raj Kumar, Consultant, NRCD of **ni-msme** visited the Tirur Virgin Coconut Oil cluster during 17-18 July 2017 to participate in SFURTI review meeting. The chairman of SPV Mr. Raveendran, CEO, and Mr. Satish Kumar, CDE of the cluster were present in the meeting. The chairman apprised about the progress of the project and assured that construction work will be completed at the earliest possible. Specifications of machinery, tendering process and precautions to be taken during machinery installation were discussed and plans drawn for implementation of soft interventions.



GST Awareness for MSMEs





















The International Day for MSMEs was celebrated at **ni-msme** campus on 27th June 2017 by conducting a meet on GST, to which MSME stakeholders were invited. About 250 delegates including entrepreneurs; representatives of industry associations, training institutions and NGOs; Government officials and tax consultants had participated in the event.

Dr. K. Laxman, President, BJP, Telangana State and Member of Legislative Assembly, Musheerabad was the Chief Guest of the celebration. Addressing the assemblage he highlighted the entrepreneurship development initiatives of Government of India and outlined the need for uniform tax in the country, and urged the MSMEs to be GST compliant. He applauded the dynamic role of the present government and observed that Udyog Adhar Memorandam has simplified the process of registration for MSMEs.

Earlier, Mr. M. Raja Mahender Reddy, President, Confederation of All India Small and Medium Pesticides Manufacturing Association (CAPMA) expressed that GST will facilitate hassle free business operations by removing the confusion due to multiple tax system. Mr. Rahul Kumar Chanti, President, DICCI, Telangana said that multiple component tax structure was making it difficult to monitor the financial transactions. The advent of GST will bring in transparency in business transactions.

Mr. M. Chandrashekar Reddy, Director General, **ni-msme** stated that GST will have wide ramification on business processes. With less than one month to the rollout, there is a grave need for entrepreneurs to ensure compliance with the Act. He added that **ni-msme** has set up an exclusive GST cell with NACEN trained faculty, organised 16 workshops in the campus so far and participated in several forums on GST for MSMEs.

Mr. Rohit Kumar Singh, Head, GSP Business, Karvy Data Management was the eminent speaker who gave valuable insights into migration from the current indirect tax to GST and how businesses are going to be impacted by the change. He also elucidated GST implications for MSME sector. Mrs. E. Vijaya, faculty of **ni-msme** emphasised the need for understanding the new tax law and how to

comply with it. Ms. Gunja Kapoor, Associate Fellow, Pahle India Foundation and Mr. Rishabh Chandra, Founder Script Technology discussed digital transformation vis-à-vis the MSMEs, need for training the MSMEs in e-commerce, helping them achieve higher sales and thus larger revenues through wider market access. They also expatiated on website designing, maintenance and important tools like SEO.

PHYSICAL AND FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

Since its inception as the Small Industry Extension Training Institute, the Institute has been depending on the Government of India for meeting its annual recurring and non-recurring expenditure.

The Institute was to identify new sources of income while implementing the recommendations of the 5th report of the Expenditure Reforms Commission of the Government of India, which helped the Institute to become self-supporting from 2001-02. However, grants for specific purposes for meeting expenditure such as one time grant and financial assistance at pre-determined hourly rates for conducting entrepreneurship and skill development programmes under the Scheme of Assistance to Training Institutions (ATI) of the Ministry are also extended.











Programmes




Participants



In the year 2017-18, the total number of training programmes conducted was 858 and the participants were 27,960 as compared to 1,136 programmes and 40,292 participants during 2016-17. The decrease in the number of programmes and participants over the previous year was mainly due to less number of programmes under ATI scheme of the Ministry during 2016-17.

The Institute generated an income of Rs.2562.43 lakh through various activities compared to the previous year of Rs.4821.03 lakhs in 2016-17. This could be attributed to the decrease in the number of entrepreneurship and skill development programmes under ATI Scheme of the Ministry over the previous year.

TRAINING ACTIVITY

A total of 695 national programmes, 32 seminars and workshops,14 international programmes and 87 programmes under the ATI Scheme of the Ministry were conducted during the year.

A few of them are indicated in the following paragraphs.

Faculty Development Programme

The executive development programmes offered are structured for various professionals in the developing countries, sponsored by the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India, under Indian Technical and Economic Cooperation (ITEC)/Special Commonwealth Assistance for Africa Programme (SCAAP)/Afro-Asian Rural Development Organisation (AARDO)/Technical Cooperation Scheme of Colombo Plan (TCS of Colombo Plan). These programmes are of 8 to 12 weeks duration, set over four phases.

The programmes offered to the international participants during the year were as follows:

















Phase-I Programmes (12 weeks) from 07 August to 27 October, 2017

- 1. Communication Skills in English and Promotion of Micro Small and Medium Enterprises (EPMSMEs)
- 2. Communication Skills in English and Tourism and Hospitality Management (ETHM)

There were 55 delegates in these two programmes under different fellowships, sponsored by the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India.

Phase-II Programmes (8 weeks) from 04 September to 27 October, 2017

- Capacity Building programme for providing Alternate Livelihood Opportunities for the poor (CBALO);
- Empowerment of Women through Enterprise (EWE); and
- 3. Innovative Strategies for SME Development (ISSD).

There were 67 delegates in these three programmes under the fellowships awarded by the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India.

Phase - III Programmes (8 weeks) from 13 November, 2017 to 05 January, 2018

- 1. Training Methods and Skills for Managers (TMSM);
- 2. Total Quality Management & ISO 9001: 2008/ 14001/22000/27000 & Six Sigma (TQM); and
- 3. SME Financing Approaches and Strategies (SMEFAS)

A total of 84 delegates took part in these five programmes. All these delegates were sponsored by the Ministry of External Affairs under ITEC/SCAAP/TCS Colombo Plan and AARDO fellowships.

Phase - IV Programmes (8 weeks) from 22 January to 16 March, 2018

- Promotion of Micro Enterprises (POME);
- 2. Planning and Promotion of Agro and Food Enterprises (PAFE);

- 3. ToT in Entrepreneurship & Skill Development (ToT-ESD); and
- 4. Tourism and Hospitality Management (THM).

In all, 139 delegates from different countries were sponsored under the fellowships awarded by the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India.

SCHEDULE - 16

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

1 METHOD OF ACCOUNTING:

The Financial Statements are prepared on the basis of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in India and the Institute adheres to the Accrural system of Accounting on a consistent basis.

2 FIXED ASSETS:

Fixed assets are stated at Cost of acquisition inclusive of transportation and incidental costs, duties and taxes and expenses relating to installation thereof.

3 DEPRECIATION:

- A. Buildings and Books / Periodicals are subject to Depreciation on their Written Down Values at the rates prescribed under CPWD Rules.
- B. All other Assets are subject to Depreciation at the rates and in the manner provided under Rule 5 of the Income Tax Rules.

4 GOVERNMENT GRANTS:

- A. Project and Programme Grants are recognised as revenue and the application thereof are treated as spendings in the year to which they relate, and unutilised grants are recognised and accounted for as such, as on the last day of the accounting year.
- B. Capital Grants received from the Ministry of MSME in respect of Acquisition of Fixed Assets are shown under the head "Reserves and Surplus" as an Earmarked Grant and the Assets purchased therefrom form part of the Schedule of Fixed Assets.

5 PROVISION FOR TAXATION:

The Institute is a Registered Society under the Provisions of Section 12AA of the Income tax (Exemptions), Hyderbad, w.e.f 8th June 2007, and is not subject to Income Tax in respect of its Net Surplus/(Deficit) for the year.

6 EMPLOYEE BENEFITS:

a) Defined Contribution Plan

Employee benefits in the form of PF is considered as defined contribution plan and the contributions are charged to the Statement Profit and Loss for the year when the contributions to the respective fund is due.

b) Defined Benefit Plan

The accruing liability towards Gratuity and Earned Leaves are accounted as per Institute policy, with out obtaining the Actuary valuation.

- 2. The Institute has completed the Implementation of several Pojects and Programmes prior to 31.03.2018. The Aggregate of the Grant amount receivable in this regard as on 31.03.2018 works out to Rs.11,51,93,849/-.
- 3. Advances to Employees in respect of Programme implementation, Tours and Travel and Advances of Temporary nature are outstanding for more than one year, pending settlement. The relevant amounts in this regard are as under:-

The above Advances must be settled and accounted for on priority.

4. In respect of the Service Tax Liability of the Institute we have taken cognisance of the Stay order No: 1236 dated 23.07.2012 passed be the Customs, Excise and Service tax Appelate tribunal, South Zonal Bench, Bengaluru, as per which there is an Interim observation that Prima Facie the Institue would be Liable to Service Tax in respect of amounts collected from outside participants and Agencies who avail the infrastructure and other facilities at the Institute. As per the Order of the Appellate Tribunal referred to supra the Institute may not be liable to Service Tax in respect of Grants received for Implementation of specific Projects of charitable nature, and we are informed that final Adjudication in this regard is awaited.

















5. Stale Cheques

Stale cheque aggregating to a sum of Rs.21,47,010/- relating to Three financial years are not accounted for as of 31.03.2018. Institute has been regularly following up the same.

6. <u>Contingent Liabilities:</u>

- a) Interest and Penalty in respect of Service Tax Liability of The Institute would require quantification and recognition consequent to final adjudication by the CESTAT, Bengaluru.
- b) M/s. Ramanantham & Rao, Chartered Accountants and former Statutory Auditors of the Institute filed a suit claiming a fee of Rs.818203/- towards their charges for the services rendered in the matter of obtaining extension relating to the exemption Oreders relating to the exemption of the Income of the Institute from the Income Tax as has been extended earlier. The City Civil Court in the O.S.No.2507 of 2010 passed decree in their favour. However the Institute has contested before the Honourable High Court. The Honourable High Court passed an Interim direction in CCAMP 290 of 2015 in CCAMP No.210 of 2015 that the interim stay earlier granted is made absolute on condition of respondent(ni msme) deposting 1/3rd of decretal amount plus costs before the trail Court. Accordingly, an amount of Rs.318525.33 was deposited in the Honourable Court Vide Challan on 14.08.2015. The Matter continues to be sub judice.
- c) No Provision was made for Rs.640861/- pertains to earlier year towards liability for conveyance allowance payable to employees as the matter is pending for final judgement in the Honourable Court of Andhra Pradesh. Further, Notice was given to the employees for discontinuance of conveyance allowance with effect from 13.10.1992.
